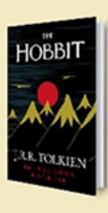

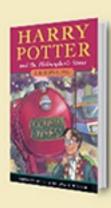

The novel was loathed by a community of Muslims for its alleged blasphemous depiction of a character modelled after the Prophet Muhammad and the transcription of the Quran.

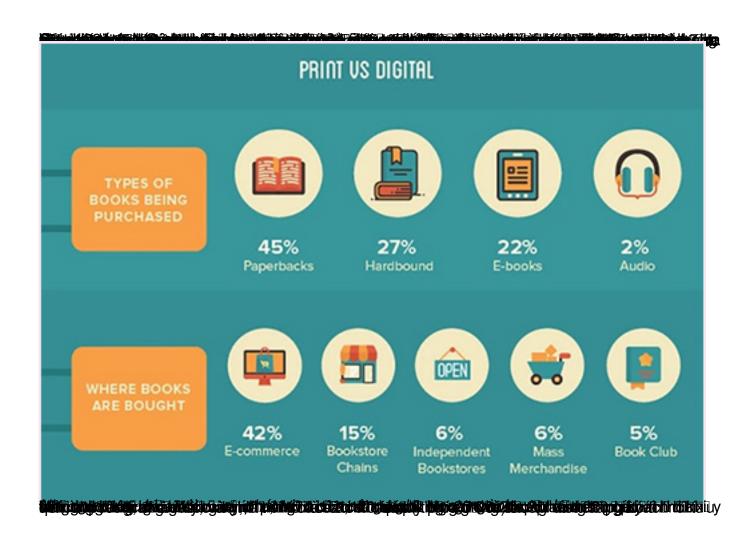

HOW TO TAKE CARE OF THE EYES WHEN READING PRINT AND ONLINE

Avoid straining your eyes when reading books with the following tips:

Having a light source behind you so that light is being directed onto the page.



Take regular breaks and follow the 20-20-20 rule. Every 20 minutes, look away from your book and look at an object 20 feet away for at least 20 seconds.



Practice blinking often to moisten your eyes. Dry eyes can be a result of staring at an object for too long.



If you are prescribed to wear corrective glasses and contact lenses, make sure to use them when reading.



Have regular eye checkups.



Online reading habits you should cultivate:

Enlarge text when you find yourself having difficulty reading small fonts.



Intense reading on a computer monitor is tiring and bad for your eyes.

When you come across a long article or document, print it out.



Adjust monitor brightness and contrast settings until you find the balance that's easy on the eyes.



If you wear corrective lenses, ask your optometrist if they're a good fit for your degree of computer use.



Exercise your eyes when you're not working on the computer by focusing on a close object (within 6 inches) for a few seconds and then focusing on a far-away object.
